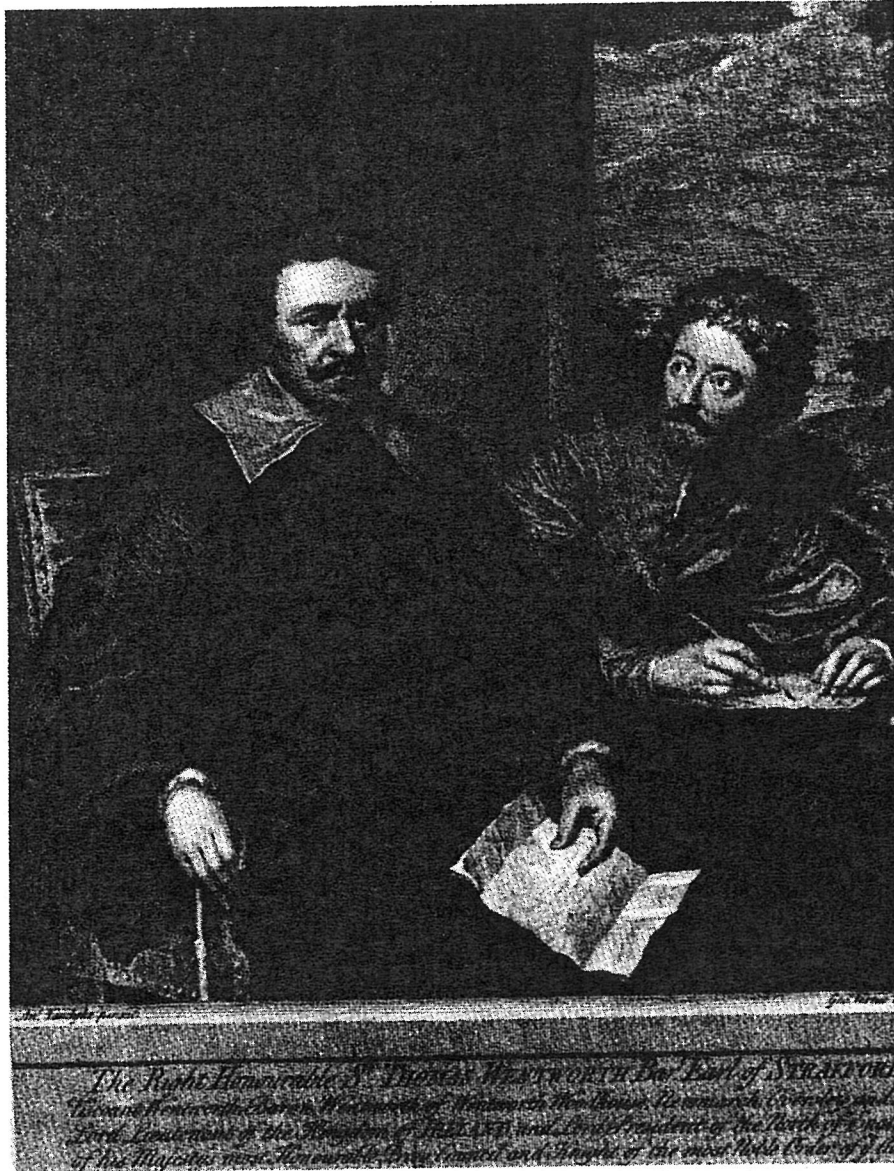

Thomas Wentworth (1593-1641), Lord Deputy of Ireland from 1632, until his recall in 1641 adopted the policy of making Ireland remunerative for the crown. In a letter written to the Lord Treasurer he made his position clear: "*I am of opinion that all wisdom advises to keep this kingdom as much subordinate and dependant upon England as is possible, and holding them from the manufacture of wool (which, unless otherwise directed, I shall by all means discourage), and then to fetch their clothing from thence [England] and to take their salt from the King (being that which preserves and gives value to all*

*their native staple commodities). How can they depart from us without nakedness and beggary? Which in itself is so weighty a consideration as a small profit should not bear it down*".
